It's so lovely to see all of the children so keen and refreshed after their half term break. Just as well that they are well rested, as it has been a really busy first week of this Spring half term.

This week, we've had a British Values' Monday, a World Book Day Thursday and an Easter Story Friday, not to mention the starting of our music theme across the school. We also had a special whole school music assembly on Tuesday to launch our new music theme. This special assembly was run by iRock and boy did it - It was fantastic. The children were quite literally rocking the school foundations with a brilliant rendition of Queen's 'We Will Rock You!' as a Year I child played electronic keyboards, two Year 6 children played the drums and electric guitar respectively, and a Reception child gave Freddie Mercury a run for his money as our lead singer, getting all the other children to join in and sing along fabulously - well done all and thank you to iRock and Miss Hampson for organising it!











World Book Day on Thursday was a really special treat for us all. It was brilliant to see so many children dressed up in their pyjamas as we got really comfortable reading books for pleasure and discussing how brilliant they are. What's been happening in school?

Nursery

Nursery have been exploring the text 'Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What do you see?'. The children have used the noticing lens to have a look around the classroom to discover which colours they could see and what objects they could notice. In Maths, we have explored patterns. We have found different types of patterns such as animal prints, spots, strips and even zig zags.

For 'World Book Day', we really enjoyed wearing our pyjamas. We got to go to the school's pop up book shop and spend our coins which was very exciting. We all chose a book that had interesting pictures. We were very excited every time the bell rang for 'ring a bell read' and all hurried to the book corner to read a story. We enjoyed looking at lots of different books in various areas of the room. The art table had a book titled 'Draw a Star' so we used some special pencils called oil pastels to draw our own stars. There were lots of different dinosaur texts in the small world and colour books on the investigation station.

We have also felt very proud when sharing our 'Wowcher' Vouchers each morning and getting a clap from our friends for the amazing achievements we have made at home.













Reception

It's been a busy fortnight back to this short half term for Reception! One of the highlights has definitely got to be World Book Day. We really enjoyed sharing our favourite stories from home throughout the week and loved coming to school on Thursday wearing our pyjamas with the addition of milk and biscuits for story time! Reception also had fun completing different activities on World Book Day including a scavenger hunt, designing a bookmark and the book character quiz.

To begin this half term, our Literacy focussed on 'Holiday News' and using our imagination to create our own stories linking to World Book Day. We have now also started our next The Write Stuff text and our puppet 'Grandma Fantastic' is helping the children to develop their vocabulary.

In Phonics, we have been focussing on our set 2 sounds. We have already learnt these sounds so our focus now is on using these sounds in our reading and writing. In the last two weeks, our focus sounds have been 'ay', 'ee', 'igh', 'ow' and 'oo' (poo at the zoo).

Our Maths learning for the last 2 weeks has been centred around number patterns within 15. We have been learning to count up to 15, select the correct number of objects, put the numbers in order and find one more/one less than a given number.

A huge thank you to all of the adults who have supported the children to create some wonderful Science projects. It was fantastic to see how much effort our class has put into this when we visited all of the projects at the Science Fayre.











Year 1

We hope you had a restful half term week? What a busy time we've had! In English, the children have been writing effective sentences for our story, using adverbial phrases to describe Grandma, as well as sights and sounds on the bus!

In Maths, we have started a brand new unit of work. Children have been learning how to place numbers from 20 to 50 in order and recognise a group of ten as one unit. They are beginning to recognise the place value of two-digit numbers as tens and ones. In Science, the children have learned about the parts of a tree and labelled them.

We celebrated World Book Day on Thursday by wearing our pyjamas! The idea was to promote a love of reading at bedtime with our families. They made bookmarks for our new Whole Class Read book 'The Koala who could' by Rachel Bright & Jim Field. They took part in a WBD KS1 Quiz, bought books from the 'Bring a book & Buy sale', and they entered a drawing competition using the 'Oi Frog' book series by Kes Gray & Jim Field as inspiration. At the end of the day, we settled down to our class story with milk and biscuits! Yummy! Ask your children if they remember any of the funny animals from the story 'You're called what?' by Kes Gray & Nikki Dyson! There were Pink Fairy Armadillos, Monkeyface Pricklebacks and Shovelnose Guitarfish, to name but a few!

On Friday, we had an RE day, looking at the Easter story. We learned the story from the Bible and watched animations of the story too. We made palm leaves and finished the day by ordering the Easter story using

pictures to help us!

Wow! What a wonderful first week!







Year 2

What a fabulous first week back. In Year 2, we started our new English Text 'Little Red Reading Hood.' The children made dens and found interesting places to read. This linked beautifully with World Book Day where we continued to read in comfortable and unusual places. The children chose a wide selection of texts to read to themselves and their peers.

In maths we have started to look at money recognising and comparing the value of coins. The children were very good at matching coins to notes and using the pound and pence symbols correctly. In this half term's curriculum work, we have started to explore music around 'Myths and Legends'. We've been looking at performing a composition and following a score. We clapped along to the beat following the rhythm to our own version of St George and the Dragon.

On Thursday, the children all wore their pyjamas for World Book Day. They found comfy places to read, answered book quizzes and wrote a character description for our WCR text 'The Dark'. Then at the end of the day, we enjoyed milk and biscuits whilst listening to 'Pumpkin Soup'. What a great way to end the day!

Finally, we looked at the true meaning of the Easter Story from the Last Supper to the Resurrection. What a busy week!











Year 3

We have started off this half term with a bang. We have been very busy but we have enjoyed every moment of it. On Monday afternoon, we focused on one of our British values: tolerance and respect. We discussed how we are all unique and how our interests make us who we are. We had a discussion about how it is okay for everybody to be different and that we should respect these differences. We created a portrait to identify all of the things that make us who we are. We will put these together to show that we are proud of all the things that make us unique.

This week, we also started reading our new whole class reading text 'Goth Girl' which we think is going to be a brilliant, fun book to read. Before we started, we had to guess what book would be our next whole class reader using clues to help us. We found out what a goth is and we even had a go at writing in a gothic style.

In English, we have started looking at the plot points for our text 'A Strong Mind'. We have looked at how we can use rhetorical questions to draw the reader in and how brackets can be used to add extra information to a list.

In Maths, we have been carrying on with our unit of multiplication and division. We have moved on to multiplying two digit numbers by one digit numbers. We have used the times tables we already know to help us and, when the questions have been particularly challenging, we have used different strategies

such as counters and dienes to help us answer the questions. We have now finished this unit and will be moving on to fractions.

On Thursday we enjoyed coming into school in our pyjamas ready for World Book Day. We took part in a mixture of different activities such as designing a book cover, writing our own stories and creating our own world book day tokens. In the afternoon, we went to the book sale and lots of us got a new book which we can enjoy at home. We also received our world book day book which everyone seemed excited about. Overall, it's been an incredibly busy week.










Year 4

What a fantastic first week back in Year 4! We started our week off with an afternoon learning all about our British Values. We have been focussing on tolerance and mutual respect and have discussed how each and every one of us is unique and that we need to respect these differences. We created posters that highlighted things about ourselves including things we like. We also discussed how it is okay to have different opinions about things and that, whilst we may not think the same as somebody else, we should respect their views and beliefs.

We have started our new whole class reader, 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe'. The class have really been enjoying this book so far and are excited to find out more about the characters' adventures in the magical land of Narnia.

In English, we have been continuing to learn new skills that we can use in newspaper report writing. We have discussed skills such as relative clauses, emotive language and adverbials. We are very close to beginning our independent writing and I can't wait to read the articles the children write!

In Maths, we are still continuing our work on fractions. We have looked at adding and subtracting fractions, as well as converting mixed numbers to improper fractions. Next, we are looking at finding fractions of quantities.



On Thursday this week, we had a fantastic time celebrating World Book Day in our pyjamas. We all joined in with a whole class game of charades, created our own bookmarks and also took part in a competition to create a World Book Day gift card. We ended the day with juice and biscuits and talking about our favourite books.

Year 5

What can I say for Year 5? Possibly the busiest couple of weeks yet! They have coped very well with the multitude of learning opportunities that have pushed some of them outside their comfort zone and I am





very proud. We have started our new curriculum unit; Music.

The children are learning the lyrics to "They live in you" from the West End musical. This has even included some impressive solos and harmonies. We hope to perform this as a class soon:)


In Science, we have worked collaboratively in groups to plan an investigation into air resistance. This has enabled the

children to give constructive feedback to their

peers about what makes a 'sensible' prediction and how our ideas should

be supported by the scientific theory and vocabulary that we have been learning during our lessons.

Each group used recycled resources to create a parachute to test how air resistance would act on it when dropped from their chosen height. We have developed the ability to refer to the planning stage when deciding how an investigation could be adapted or changed if









To start this half term, we have recalled why the British values: tolerance and respect are so important to community, effective relationships and harmony between everyone.

Year 5 offered some very insightful and mature responses during our class discussion, along with some beautifully presented work in their books.

In Maths, we have continued to embed the rules for calculating the area and perimeter of compound shapes and we have since moved on to decimals, fractions and percentage work.

To finish, Year 5 have begun to attend their first swimming sessions this academic year and even though some felt a little nervous, they persevered and showed great levels of resilience. Onwards and upwards everyone - well done!

Year 6

Welcome back! I hope you all had a wonderful, restful half term. We have returned with a bang and have dived straight back into our learning.

In English, we have been completing our No More Marking assessment piece where children have independently planned and written a story based on a spaceship crash. There were a vast array of ideas from 1st person recounts to descriptive writing to alien invasions. We worked hard to ensure our writing demonstrated our understanding including: higher level sentence structures, higher level language alongside the writing devices we have looked at this year. We will now submit these pieces of writing and they will be compared with thousands of other Year 6 pieces of writing from across the country- we look forward to the findings.

In Maths, we have been looking at calculating the area and perimeter of regular and irregular shapes. We have also begun to apply our understanding of decimals and measure (e.g. 3.6cm) to support this work. Many of Year 6 have found this quite challenging, especially finding the area of irregular or compound shapes, but they have been incredibly resilient and shown great perseverance. Great work Year 6!

In our curriculum lessons, we have begun our Musical 'Power of Performance' theme. We thoroughly enjoyed the performance from iRock Music School and a number of pupils expressed interest in lessons; Rachel and Charlie enjoyed rocking out at the front. Alongside this, we have begun our learning around film scores. We began the theme with a pop quiz recognising different famous theme tunes and used musical vocabulary to describe the pieces e.g. dynamics, tempo, melody, pitch etc..



We also enjoyed celebrating World Book Day in our pyjamas, sharing a 'bedtime' story together and sharing our favourite books. There is a vast range of 'favourites' in Year 6 from: the Harry Potter books, to Michael Morpurgo stories, to non-fiction animal texts. When we discussed these titles, all the children could summarise their favourite books well and articulate the reasons for their choice. The ring-a-read happened numerous times throughout the day even in the middle of lessons; we dropped everything and picked up our books. Keep reading Year 6; I wonder who will be attending the cinema trip with me?!

Attendance

If your child is going to be absent from school for any reason then please let us know as soon as possible:

- Report their absence via our Parentmail App

Please be aware you must report your child's absence every day that they are unable to attend. The information below shows how attendance can affect your child's future progression. If we have not heard from you by 10am after trying all the contact numbers we will do a home visit.

At Tenterfields we aim for pupils to achieve an attendance figure of above 97% or more.

Above 97%: Less than 6 days absence a year – Less than 30 Hours of Learning Lost

Excellent attendance! These young people will almost certainly get the best levels/grades they can, leading to better prospects for the future. Pupils will also get into a habit of attending school which will help in the future.

95%: 10 days absence a year – 50 Hours of Learning Lost

These pupils are less likely to achieve their target levels/grades and will start to find it difficult to maintain a habit of attending school regularly. Pupils who take a two-week holiday every year can only achieve 95% attendance.

90%: 19 days absence a year – 95 Hours of Learning Lost

The Government classes pupils in this group as "Persistent Absentees", and it will be almost impossible to keep up with work and achieve their target levels/grades. Parents of young people in this group could also face the possibility of legal action being taken by Dudley Council, including the issuing of Penalty Notices and Fines.
