## What's been happening in school?



## Nursery

Nursery have been in a world of fairytale classics over the past fortnight. The children have dived into the world of 'Little Red Riding Hood' and 'The Three Little Pigs'. During our whole class reading session the children have created role play scenarios and retold stories. The children have learnt what a character is and what a setting is. We have discussed the characters and settings from our
 fairytales.


In maths the children have been looking at measuring. We have learnt about the size of objects using the vocabulary tall, long and short. We have investigated the weight of objects using the words heavy and light. The children used balance scales to observe the items moving up and down depending on their weight. We finally learnt about capacity and are now able to identify when something is full or empty.


The planetarium visit was a big highlight of our fortnight. The children were so sensible on their walk over to Manor Way and when we arrived they enjoyed playing in the outdoor area. When we finally arrived at the Planetarium, the children were gazing in awe and wonder at the sights.

The last few weeks have been packed full of fun with our Science Planetarium visit, Science Week, World Book Day, Red Nose Day and the Mother's Day Tea Party. In preparation for the Mothers' Day Tea Party, the children have been practising a song performance and thinking of all the reasons why they love their mum. We have thoroughly enjoyed all of the celebrations and we are so proud of how hard the children have been working.

Our current Whole Class Reading text is 'Handa's Surprise'. In Literacy, we have spent time talking about the setting and characters of this story. We found out that the story is set in Africa and we have made comparisons between Africa and England, including the way people
 travel, where people live and the clothes they wear. During Continuous Provision, the children have been building different types of houses in the Construction Area; drawing maps to show how Handa travels to Akeyo's village; exploring and completing observational drawings on the fruit; painting the animals; re-telling the story in the Small
 World Area and playing fruit bingo.

In Phonics, we have learnt the sounds 'air' (that's not fair), 'ir' (whirl and twirl), 'ou' (shout it out) and 'oy' (toy for a boy). The children are making lots of progress with applying these new sounds when reading as well as writing. As part of our Phonics and Literacy, the children are learning to read and write captions and short captions.

In Maths, our focus has been on counting up to 15 objects, ordering the numbers and finding one more/one less. The children are building their confidence by using objects, pictures and numbers to show their learning. In our lessons, we have been working with a partner, supporting each other and using new vocabulary to explain our learning to others.


In Science, linked to our story of Handa's Surprise, we have explored a variety of fruits. We have introduced some more unusual fruits, including passionfruit, pomegranate, lychee and guava. Cutting open and looking inside the fruits has been a part of our learning and we have also tasted the fruits to help us to describe their taste as well as their look. This week, our investigation question has been 'When an apple is cut open, what happens to the
 apple over time?' The children have enjoyed exploring different varieties of apples: describing their colour, texture and scent; looking at the seeds inside through magnifying glasses and observing changes to the apple itself over time.

## Year 1

We have had a very busy but brilliant time in Year 1 lately! We really enjoyed our amazing Science week activities and we loved visiting Manor Way for the planetarium workshop. We had so much fun on World Book Day!

In English we have been busy editing our amazing persuasive writing. We have also been practising writing sentences with a capital letter, finger spaces and full stops and we have been joining sentences with the word 'and' and practising our handwriting.

In Maths we continued to learn about the place value of numbers and we have been practising counting in $1 \mathrm{~s}, 2 \mathrm{~s}, 5 \mathrm{~s}$ and 10 s . We have been spotting number patterns in number sequences and we have been recognising if the number patterns are going forwards or backwards, if they are going up in $1 \mathrm{l}, 2 \mathrm{~s}, 5 \mathrm{~s}$ or 10 s and making our own number patterns.

In History we have continued to learn about significant individuals. We learnt more about Edith Cavell and then we put all of our knowledge together and compared Edith Cavell with Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. We worked in groups of three to organise facts about the three nurses and we matched different information to them

We had a fabulous visit to Manor Way to see the Planetarium! As well as visiting the Planetarium we also got to visit the Year 1 classroom and spent some time with the Year 1 children at Manor Way. We had a look at their play equipment and we even got to go on their climbing wall! We learnt lots about space and we enjoyed sitting in the planetarium and watching the display.

We have been super busy getting ready for Mother's Day. We have been busy preparing and practising our song and we even showed it to the rest of the school. We have been writing about why our lovely mums are so special and why we love them so much and we wrote up our work neatly and drew a lovely picture of ourselves with our mums. $\square$


## Year 2



Wow what a busy two weeks we have had at school. Year 2 have been amazing and they have blown me away with how hard they have worked during tests and the respect they have shown when visiting the planetarium. Last week we visited Manor way to see the planetarium. We met Ozzy the Owl and he was able to show us all the different constellations in the night sky. We were fascinated to see all of the different patterns the stats made and to hear about the stories that went with them. The planetarium really wowed us and will be something we remember for a long time.


Last Week we also celebrated world book day. Everybody looked fantastic in their costumes and I could tell you put lots of thought into your costumes. We took part in lots of different book related activities including taking part in the ring a bell read where we got to read our favourite books. We enjoyed sharing a story together at the end of the day which was a great way to celebrate our love for reading.

In English we have been working hard and we have written not 1 but 2 independent pieces of writing these past two weeks. We finished our unit of writing about our character Mabel and how we could show that she was a star just like her sister. We enjoyed this writing unit and we all thought of some brilliant ways to carry on and end the rest of the story. We were able to create a success criteria which helped us to ensure we were using literary devices that would help develop our writing. We also wrote a recount of our trip to the planetarium. We needed to make sure that we wrote our story in the order of the events that happened. It was great to
 see the enthusiasm and enjoyment come through in everybody's writing.

This week we have been working hard practising for our mothers day royal tea party. All children have given their $100 \%$ during rehearsals and when creating their beautiful mothers day gifts. I think everyone who came on Thursday can agree with me in saying that their performance was brilliant and they should certainly be proud of themselves.


## Year 3

We have had a very busy couple of weeks in year 3 from planetarium visits to world book day. The children have really enjoyed participating in all of these wonderful events. They have been working very hard in English to produce their own adventure story all about space and in maths they have been exploring strategies to help us calculate multiplication and division.

In English we have been creating an adventure story all about Erin who sneaks on board her Mom's boat but unfortunately falls off. We have explored all the different creatures we would find in the ocean to help us enhance our writing. The children have loved exploring different creatures and their characteristics and this has really helped them to add lots of interesting facts into their writing. As we enjoyed a wonderful afternoon at the planetarium it seemed very fitting that their independent write would be an adventure story all about space. The children have been plotting their ideas to form their narrative and are very excited to get writing.

In maths the children have continued our multiplication and division topic but we are now exploring the different strategies we can use to help. To help we have been chanting our tables and quizzing themselves in every spare second. The children have been brilliant at recalling their 3 and 4 times tables and we are now adding our 8 times tables in. We have seen a few people moving up on the TTRS leaderboard already.

We have now come to the end of our brilliant whole class reading book; 'The Nothing to see here hotel.' The children have loved this book and we have certainly enjoyed some giggles along the way. Every chapter has been brilliant and the children have really enjoyed getting to know these characters and find out more about their crazy adventures. We have been encouraging others to read this wonderful adventure by writing our own book reviews.

We have been lucky enough to visit the portable planetarium. This allowed us to explore the different planets and how the sky changes throughout the day. The children really enjoyed the whole experience with some of them even volunteering themselves to go to Mars. I think it's fair to say that we have some budding astronauts on our hands.

Not only did we enjoy our planetarium visit we then had World Book Day. The children all looked amazing in their outfits. We enjoyed an assembly which of course included a book quiz. We then redesigned our favourite book covers and created our own book reviews to recommend our favourite books to others. In the afternoon we all went on a scavenger hunt with a difference. The children had a list of things they needed to find but not from all
 around them but instead they had to find the answers inside books. The children were all very keen to find those answers and any book they found was thoroughly searched.

The children have been rehearsing for our special Mother's day royal tea. They have been fantastic and have made sure every rehearsal they have put $100 \%$ effort in. I am very proud of them for all their efforts and they should be very proud of themselves.


## Year 4

What a busy but absolutely brilliant couple of weeks we have had! We had a
 brilliant time at Manor Way for a planetarium workshop where we got to explore the different planets in our solar system and take a closer look at what they look like and what scientists have already discovered about them.

We had the most amazing three days at Astley Burf, taking part in lots of fun activities including rock climbing, the high ropes, archery and a walk around the local area. Everyone worked so well as a team in their different groups and showed great resilience even when things were out of our comfort zone. They were also immensely supportive of their peers when they
 were missing home.


In English we are now ready to begin our independent writing of a newspaper report about a creature that has washed up on a local beach. Everyone has had fun exploring the issues around plastic pollution and it is great to see them all discussing the changes that we can make each day and also in the future. I can't wait to read their finished reports!

In Maths we have finished our unit on fractions and will be moving on to look at time. We will explore telling the time using both analogue and digital clocks as well as converting between the two. We will also look at different scenarios involving time such as how long we need to wait for a train or how long it takes to travel somewhere.

Year 4 have also been working incredibly hard practising for our Mother's Day Tea Party. Everyone has given 100\% effort each time we
 have practised and should be proud of themselves!

## Sharing Our Teaching and Learning Strategies

Currently, we are working with the children on their communication and oracy skills in the classroom, in order to give them a voice that they can use with confidence.

For this, we will be using the language of 'Loud and proud' to help the children to use the appropriate volume and intonation when speaking in front of a group of people. We will also be asking the children to 'say it again, say it better' to support children with saying words in full sentences. Tim Berners-Lee is a London born computer scientist whose interest in computers ran in the family, with his parents being part of the Invention of the first computer. Tim practised his love of engineering as a child by studying electric trains and going on to build a computer in an old television set. As a scientist, Tim was determined to solve the problem of needing to switch between different platforms to do different jobs on a computer. From this came his invention of the world wide web. His work in this area means that we are now able to access different web pages from anywhere in the world using a variety of different devices. I wonder what we'll all use the world wide web for this week?


## Author of the Month: Joseph Coelho

Joseph grew up in London during the 1980's and lived in a tower block with his mum and little sister. His earliest memory of writing a poem is when he entered a poetry competition in secondary school. He wrote a poem about the life of a performing bear, chained and made to dance. He didn't win but he showed resilience and carried on writing poetry about how he was feeling, poems about life at school, angry poems, sad poems, funny poems and sometimes he'd nervously share those poems in his drama class.

## School Hours
